



# Harper College, Oakton Community College, and Heartland Community College work together to create a new nursing study abroad program.

As part of the Illinois Consortium of International Studies and Programs (ICISP), Harper College nursing faculty, Lisa Ayers, has been working with faculty from Oakton and Heartland to develop a two-week study abroad program to Tanzania. In this program, students will attend multiple cultural outings, participate in service-learning, take language classes, visit local medical centers, see local universities, while earning course credit.

It can be challenging for students in health career programs to fit in studying abroad, especially with fewer specialized programs than other areas. This program allows for increased participation of this demographic while giving our students the relevant international experience that will prepare them for their future careers. The program is set to run in late spring. Students from all ICISP colleges will have the opportunity to come together to share their passion for nursing and intercultural learning. A special thank you to Lisa Ayers who has dedicated her time and expertise to developing this program. We look forward to seeing this program grow.

## Social Justice Leadership Certificate Program

In collaboration with the Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, OIE coordinates the Social Justice Leadership Certificate program, a year-long, project-based curriculum focusing on social justice theory, the institutional structure and organizational decision-making practices of the college. The program is open to all staff and faculty and is aimed at building capacity among employees to participate in and lead DEI initiatives at the college.

The 2020-2021 cohort faced the unique challenge of being the first cohort to be done completely remote. Although this was challenging for both the participants and the facilitators the group was successful and created great projects that we look forward to seeing the impact of on the Harper College community in the coming months and years.

This summer, we welcomed Dr. Tamara Johnson, VP for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, and launched our fourth and largest cohort of 11 members. We have already read *Our Time is Now* by Stacy Abrams as a shared book-read and discussion, and have planned a dynamic Social Justice Retreat for this fall.

## Staying Connected Through Social Media

Over the past year, the Office of International Education found new ways to stay connected with the Harper students, employees, and community members using social media, primarily Instagram. We are posting interactive content including "Trivia Tuesday" and travel-related "Would You Rather" polls, educational posts including international days of importance, fun facts, and holidays around the world, and continue to post about upcoming events.

Another area of focus in social media has been creating videos on YouTube. Through the *World Views* series, we have been able to share the stories of internationalization among the Harper community. ### The World Comes to Harper Classrooms through Virtual Exchange

During the pandemic year, the Office of International Education has been actively seeking innovative opportunities for our students to engage with the world. While our students have not been able to explore the world through education abroad, the world has come to Harper classrooms through technology. This past semester alone, over 200 students have been engaged in global online learning through people-to-people dialog. They have interacted with peers in over 15 countries on 4 different continents through technology-enabled people-to-people dialog. Another 300 + students have benefited from synchronous and asynchronous educational materials provided through our partners in Costa Rica.

All aspects of the programs are intentionally integrated into the learning outcomes and curriculum of the courses. A selection of student comments suggests the depth of the impact these courses have had:

"[The program] exceeded my expectations and is providing me with a multicultural learning experience. I value this, especially as a college student in the pandemic, because the option to study abroad, travel with a class, or simply go on vacation are not options at the moment." "One of my biggest takeaways . . . is how important it is to 'agree to disagree'. This mentality allows for the discussion of 'sensitive' topics such as politics, religion, and culture while respecting other peers and their opinions." (SOLIYA Connect: ENG 101 student)

# WHAT'S NEW IN INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION AT HARPER COLLEGE

## Impact Data of Global Region of Focus Initiative and Reboot of South Asia

As you may know, our most recent Global Region of Focus is Asia, with a focus on South Asia. In the spring of 2020, right before the pandemic sent us all home, 17 faculty from 13 different departments, including both transfer and career programs, participated in our faculty development GEC seminar. Although we have only had sporadic curriculum infusion thus far, we anticipate that in fall 2021 the participants will implement their projects. Seven of the GRF faculty cohort are included in a \$10,000 Midwest Institute for Intercultural /International Education (MIIIE) 4-year grant. We look forward to working with them and tracking the impact of their projects. Unfortunately, we have also had to twice abandon the RFP process for the Faculty International Field Seminar to India, but have rebooted the GRF cycle and extended it to 2024.

This past year, Institutional Research provide us with impact data covering the first two iterations of our GRF. As the tables below show, the data demonstrate that students in courses taught by faculty who have been through our professional development programs (GEC and FIFS) demonstrate higher rates of completion and persistence.

#### **Global Scholar Distinction**

The Distinction in International Perspectives has been renamed as the Global Scholars Distinction. The aim of the Distinction is that any student who has achieved this graduation honor will have demonstrated the capacity to consider intercultural and international perspectives across academic disciplines and the willingness to actively explore issues relating to global equity, justice, and peace. In the last year, the Office of International Education has been working with several faculty members and students to revise the Distinction in order to solicit more equitable and accessible student participation. The revision focuses on three areas of the program: experiential international education, a capstone project, and the logistics of the program. We have been coordinating our work with the Social Justice Studies Taskforce and hope to align both "distinctions" in their design.

It should be noted that OIE has promoted the concept of an interdisciplinary, transcriptive graduation *Endorsement in Transformational Learning* that would comprise different tracks in various areas of study (such as Social Justice, Global Studies, Environmental and Sustainability Studies, Gender Studies, etc.). With the advent of the new Social Justice Studies Coordinator position, it is the hope of the OIE that this role will not only lead to radical change in the climate and curricula of our campus but that it will also lead to even greater transformation by paving the way for more opportunities for our students to pursue area studies from a variety of perspectives.

#### **Global Teaching Certificate GEC**

#### **Fulbright-Hays Group Projects Abroad**

#### Short-Term Curriculum Development

A curriculum development team, composed of several faculty members or teachers or administrators, may spend four to six weeks in a foreign country or region acquiring resources materials for curriculum development in modern foreign language or area studies programs. Resource materials may include artifacts, documents, books, educational films, museum reproductions, recordings, and other instructional materials. The project shall provide a systemic use and dissemination of the acquired materials

#### Fulbright Foreign Language Teaching Assistant (FLTA) Grant

The Fulbright Foreign Language Teaching Assistant Program (FLTA) is sponsored by the United States Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA). As part of the Fulbright Foreign Students Program, the Fulbright FLTA Program is designed to develop Americans' knowledge of foreign cultures and languages by supporting teaching assistantships in over 30 languages at hundreds of U.S. institutions of higher education. The program offers educators from over 50 countries the opportunity to develop their professional skills and gain first-hand knowledge of the U.S., its culture, and its people. ### **GRANTS**

The Office of International Education has been very productive this past year in the pursuit of a variety of grants. We have been awarded three grants and submitted two additional proposals. We are also working on an additional two grant proposals for submission this coming academic year.

#### **Awarded Grants**

# Midwest Institute for Intercultural/International Education (MIIIE) and the South Asia Center at the University of Washington

OIE was awarded a 4-year \$10,000 grant to fund faculty curriculum infusion projects focusing on South Asia which coincides with our present Global Region of Focus.

In addition to the multi-year grant, two Harper faculty, Pearl Ratunil (English) and Malathy Chandrasekar (Economics), were among 12 faculty selected to receive a Curriculum Infusion grant from MIIIE. Their curriculum infusion modules will also focus on South Asia.

#### Center for Global Studies at University of Illinois—Urbana Champaign

For each of the past four years, OIE has received a \$2000 award to support international education programs through the Center's Title VIA National Resource Center funding. This pandemic year, CGS has allowed OIE an additional year in which to use the funds. This coming academic year, OIE will use the funds to support its GRF South Asia programs

# **Awarded Grants (Continued)**

#### Institute of International Education (IIE) American Passport Project grant (\$3625)

Harper College was one of 40 colleges and universities to be awarded the grant, which provides funding to help first-year, Pell-eligible students obtain a U.S. passport. Working with the Harper College Grants Office, the OIE will promote the application and nomination process during the first week of fall classes. Our goal is to assist 25 students in receiving a U.S. passport, an often unachievable access point to the world, before the winter break.

# 100,000 Strong in the Americas 2021 Innovation Fund Grant Competition to Build Partnerships and Training Programs between the United States, Central America, and the Dominican Republic (\$25,000)

With our Costa Rican partners, Universidad Nacional de Costa Rica (UNA), we have proposed a partnership with a focus on innovation in teaching and training and intercultural exchange. If funded, students will first interact virtually and then 6 students and two teachers will travel for a 10-14 day cultural and educational exchange at the partnering campus. The overarching goal of this project is to create a sustained collaborative, intercultural partnership that takes an experiential, virtual-learning approach to explore the interconnectedness of college and career readiness. We are building on our existing partnership with UNA to advance the success of our students by sharing academic practices, building technology skills, and strengthening our bilateral internationalization programs.

### **Grant Proposals In Progress**

#### **Fulbright Scholar-In-Residence**

As we have in the past, we are applying to host a Fulbright SIR from South Asia for the 2022-2023 academic year. The primary purpose of the Scholar's visit will be to galvanize our internationalization efforts through the full range of their activities, presentations, and collaborations, and interactions with our faculty, staff, students, and community. Additional benefits will include establishing collaborative relationships with faculty at the Scholar's home institution; fostering opportunities for faculty and student exchanges with departments at the Scholar's institution; creating sustainable interdisciplinary education abroad programs to the Scholar's country or another country in South/Southeast Asia; strengthening our Asian course offerings, library holdings, and cultural programming; and enhancing international faculty development opportunities.

### **Fulbright-Hays Group Projects Abroad (GPA)**

OIE is working on a grant proposal to fund a six-week professional development seminar to Kenya and Uganda entitled "Sustainable Conservation in East Africa through a Social Justice Lens" for 12 educators and two Seminar leaders from post-secondary and secondary educational institutions in Illinois.
