WHAT'S NEW IN INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION AT HARPER COLLEGE

Globally-Infused Curricula make their debut in a Continuing Education course.

In an interactive learning environment with faculty from different disciplines, participants will learn about and research the history of sugar as a plant, food supplement, and a global commodity.

Topics covered will include

- how sugar entered the human diet by accident
- how it was considered a rare and expensive spice in the Middle Ages
- how it drove the Atlantic slave trade from the 16th through 18th centuries
- how it threatens our environment, our societies, and our health

Every week, an instructor from a different discipline will offer perspectives and background information on sugar according to their subject field and provide readings that engage the topic of sugar.

WHAT'S NEW

ENG 101 Students to Participate in Soliya Connect Program

This spring, Rich Johnson's ENG 101s will look a lot different than they have in the past and not just because they're online.

The Office of International Education has partnered through the Stevens Initiative with Soliya Connect to bring together Rich's students and students from the Middle East and North Africa to have guided conversations on topics chosen by the students like family, culture, the role of men and women in society, stereotypes, and more.

The class will focus on Intercultural Dialog and Exchange. All the readings and assignments for the course are geared toward preparing the students through self-reflection for interactions with peers studying in the Middle East and North Africa. They will be taking pre and post intercultural surveys, a couple of the Implicit Association Tests, and working on individual intercultural development plans.

In the second half of the semester, students will interact directly with peers on a weekly basis to discuss issues and topics that interest them, like family, identity, popular culture, contemporary politics, stereotypes, whatever they come up with together. These discussions will be led by a trained cross-cultural facilitator.

Students will not only achieve all the learning outcomes of ENG 101 but also gain critical 21st-century skills and attitudes needed to succeed in an interconnected and multicultural world that will enhance transfer applications and be attractive to future employers.

WHAT'S NEW

With sounds of tropical birds like the Three-wattled Bellbird and the Montezuma Oropendola in the background, the El Jamaical Field Station in Costa Rica has long served as a second home to Harper students studying field biology abroad during the winter intersession. The field station, which contains large tracts of primary and secondary premontane tropical forest, is nestled between the Alberto Manual Brenes Biological Reserve and the town of San Ramon. The field station not only provides a great environment for students to study biodiversity and tropical ecology, but the field station managers, Gustavo Orozco and his wife Katherine Peña, have inspired students throughout the years to learn more about biological conservation, sustainability, and Costa Rican culture.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, students were unable to travel to the El Jamaical Field Station this past academic year, yet members of Harper's biology department still wanted students to be able to experience the wonders of tropical forests and learn from Gustavo's vast knowledge of the organisms and ecological processes contained therein. As a result of this desire, a collaboration between Gustavo, the biology department, and the Office of International Education formed to help bring the rainforest to our students. During the fall semester, Gustavo and Katherine developed a series of seven video modules from the field station, exploring topics ranging from endangered species, soil chemistry, ethnobotany, biodiversity, to conservation in tropical forests. These videos have been used in multiple biology courses and have given students a wonderful opportunity to explore the tropics at a time when many of them cannot leave their neighborhoods.

The partnership between Gustavo and the Office of International Education continues this semester and may include live virtual exchanges between students and Gustavo, in addition to video modules exploring topics related to Costa Rica. These exchanges and modules can explore a myriad of topics related to Costa Rica, including biodiversity, food, geography, and indigenous groups.

In this pandemic year, CCID is holding a virtual annual conference, we have a record number of Harper faculty and staff participating and presenting.

Strengthening the Collective Voice for Change: Toward a Framework for Building Social Justice Leadership Capacity

In this presentation, a range of speakers including the co-creators of the Social Justice Leadership Certificate program, senior administrators, and faculty and staff alumni of the program discuss the genesis and value of the year-long professional development opportunity. Alumni, coaches, and present participants discuss their projects and the impact of the SJLC program on their intercultural and social justice leadership development. The objectives of the presentation include promoting similar programs at other institutions and orienting the audience toward an awareness of social justice in all areas of their institutions.

Addressing Environmental Justice Issues Through a Global Lens in STEM Courses

In this presentation, Julie Ellefson, Joseph Wachter, and Nellie Khalil extend their presentation at the 2020 #scholarstrike which focuses on environmental racism and environmental justice in the Chicago area. For the CCID presentation, they will discuss how various environmental issues not only affect local communities in the Chicago area, but communities abroad, as well, and how these issues are interrelated. Further, they will address how an interdisciplinary approach may help to engage students in the exploration of these sustainability issues.

Visualize This! Using Geospatial Technologies to Promote Global Learning

You are no doubt familiar with the COVID-19 Dashboard from Johns Hopkins University and its vivid visual representations of the pandemic and its spread. But many of us may not know that the power behind the Dashboard is an array of geospatial technologies. Members of the GIS CoP will focus on the application of these technologies to the global learning classroom, featuring the way in which Geographic Information Systems (GIS) and related technologies can transform curriculum in dynamic and engaging ways. Some topics covered in the presentation include using these technologies to visualize and compare data, create compelling narratives using interactive maps, and add dynamic value to education abroad programs.

Fulbright-Hays Group Projects Abroad

Short-Term Curriculum Development

A curriculum development team, composed of several faculty members or teachers or administrators, may spend four to six weeks in a foreign country or region acquiring resources materials for curriculum development in modern foreign language or area studies programs. Resource materials may include artifacts, documents, books, educational films, museum reproductions, recordings, and other instructional materials. The project shall provide a systemic use and dissemination of the acquired materials

Fulbright Foreign Language Teaching Assistant (FLTA) Grant

The Fulbright Foreign Language Teaching Assistant Program (FLTA) is sponsored by the United States Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA). As part of the Fulbright Foreign Students Program, the Fulbright FLTA Program is designed to develop Americans' knowledge of foreign cultures and languages by supporting teaching assistantships in over 30 languages at hundreds of U.S. institutions of higher education. The program offers educators from over 50 countries the opportunity to develop their professional skills and gain first-hand knowledge of the U.S., its culture, and its people.
