The Global Scholar Distinction program gives you an opportunity to explore intercultural and international perspectives as you pursue your major at Harper College. It is designed to expand your awareness of global systems, the interdependence of cultures, sustainable development, and global justice, equity and peace. To become a Global Scholar, students complete three qualifying classes that may already be a part of their degree plan and work on a capstone project under the guidance of a faculty mentor.



This past Fall was the first time we ran the capstone project in the form of a course and as a cohort. The results could not have been better. Students reported that the course was a one-of-a-kind experience where the cohort built a safe environment to discuss sensitive topics, learn from each other, and develop essential personal and professional skills. While at Harper College, I participated in the Art 105: Seeing Italy Then and Now study abroad. The short term study abroad was excellent and had amazing professors who made sure each student had the opportunity to make the most of their cultural learning experiences and trip abroad. As someone with learning disabilities, I especially benefited from the experiential learning aspects of my study abroad programs. The success of my Harper study abroad journeys inspired me to go on Semester at Sea, Spring 2017 Voyage around the world, which I used as a Global Scholars Distinction project at Harper.

Professors Stephany Rimland and Karen Patterson taught the Introduction to Visual Arts course in Italy where we visited Milan, Florence, Siena, Ravenna, Padua and Venice. While in Florence we were privileged to see the Last Supper by Leonardo Da Vinci, tour the Uffizi Gallery, and see Michelangelo's David. Another special aspect of the program was attending the Venice Biennale contemporary international art exhibition, which is often described as the "Olympics of the Art World." One of the major learning outcomes of the trip to Italy was the creation of a course reflection journal. I used current and vintage post cards in my journal to illustrate and reflect on the theme of "Art Then and Now" for various world-renowned Italian renaissance works of art and architecture. The use of journaling to process experiences, learning and memories showed me the value of time spent on reflection in the education process.

I believe in the power of experiential learning and that it is the best way to learn about another culture, even if it is for a short period of time. If I could recommend one thing to every college student, it would be to study abroad. There are many affordable short-term study abroad programs available, as well as semester long programs on practically any topic in countries all around the world. You will learn so much about yourself and other cultures, while gaining the skills to be an effective global citizen and a success in our interconnected world economy.

Institutional Scholarships: Harper Foundation



Harper has three institutional scholarships for study abroad: Castle International Studies, WorldView Study Abroad Fund, and Global Learning Opportunities Broaden Education (GLOBE).

All these scholarships still have funds for the Spring/Summer programs we are promoting, with awards ranging from \$500 to \$1,000.

FEA: Fund for Education Abroad

Americanah by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie

Explore: Nigeria, Life of an African International Student in the USA, Cultural Clashes, Race & Colorism

Ifemelu and Obinze, a young couple deeply in love, make the decision to leave Nigeria, which is under military rule, to pursue their education in England and the United States. Ifemelu chooses to go to America, where she faces the challenges of navigating her identity as a black individual for the first time, despite her academic achievements. On the other hand, Obinze had intended to join her, but due to the restrictions imposed after the events of 9/11, he finds himself embarking on a perilous and undocumented life in London. After a span of fifteen years, they reunite in a newly democratic Nigeria, reigniting their love for each other and their shared passion for their homeland.

International Students Club


Experience global perspectives right here at Harper College!

The Club meets on Thursdays, at 3:30 pm, in D-195


