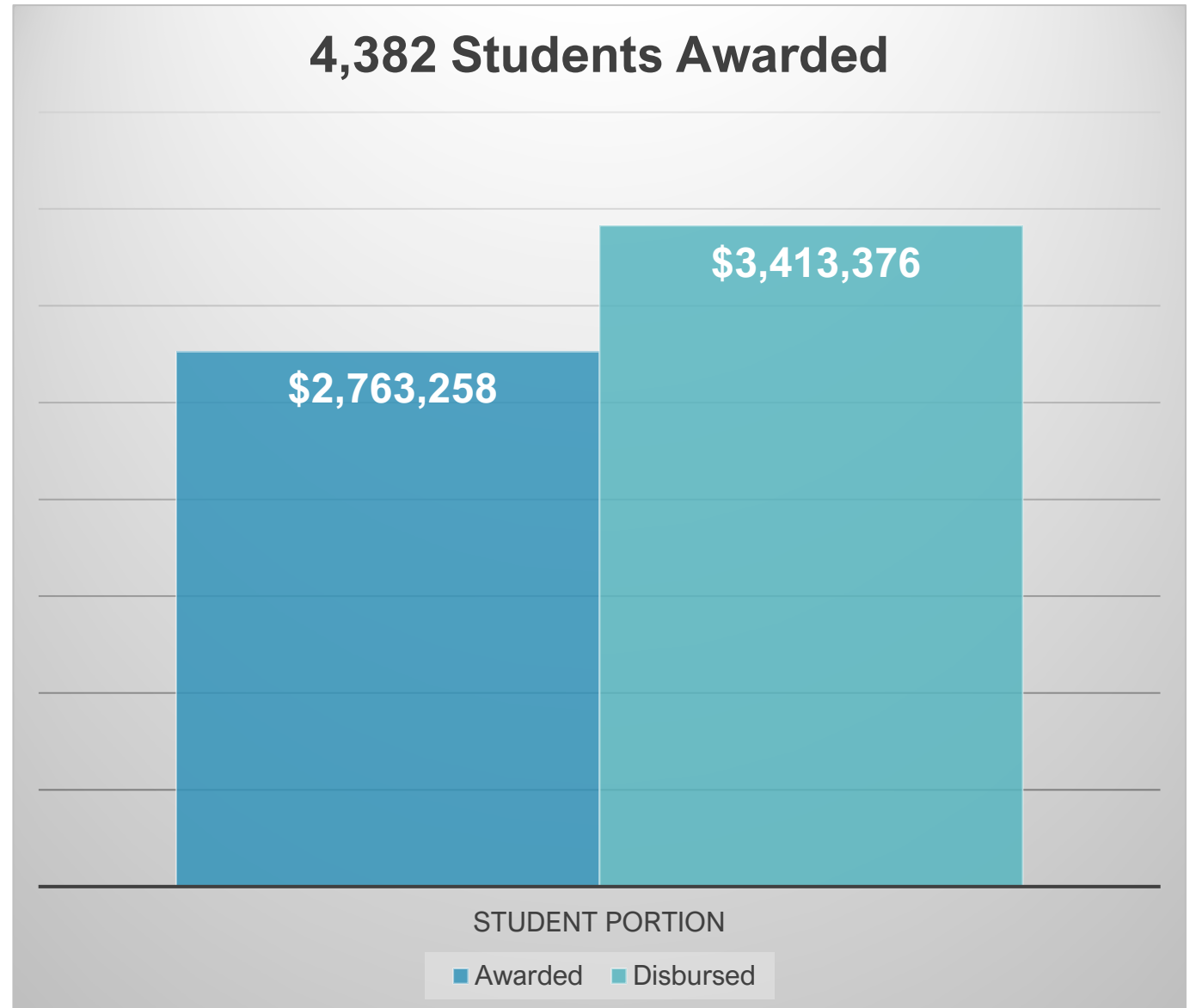

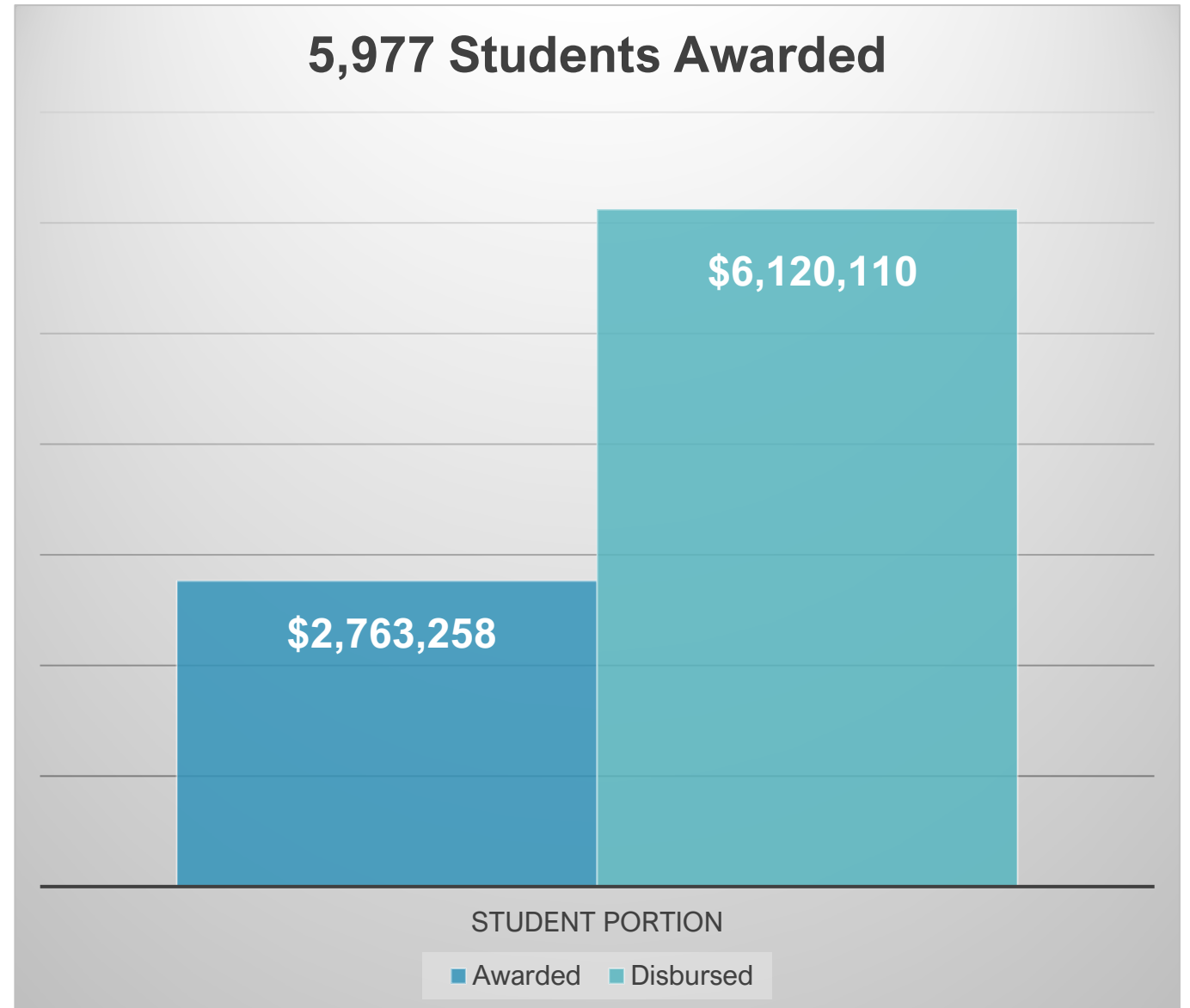

HEERF I - Grant Award and Student Aid Disbursed



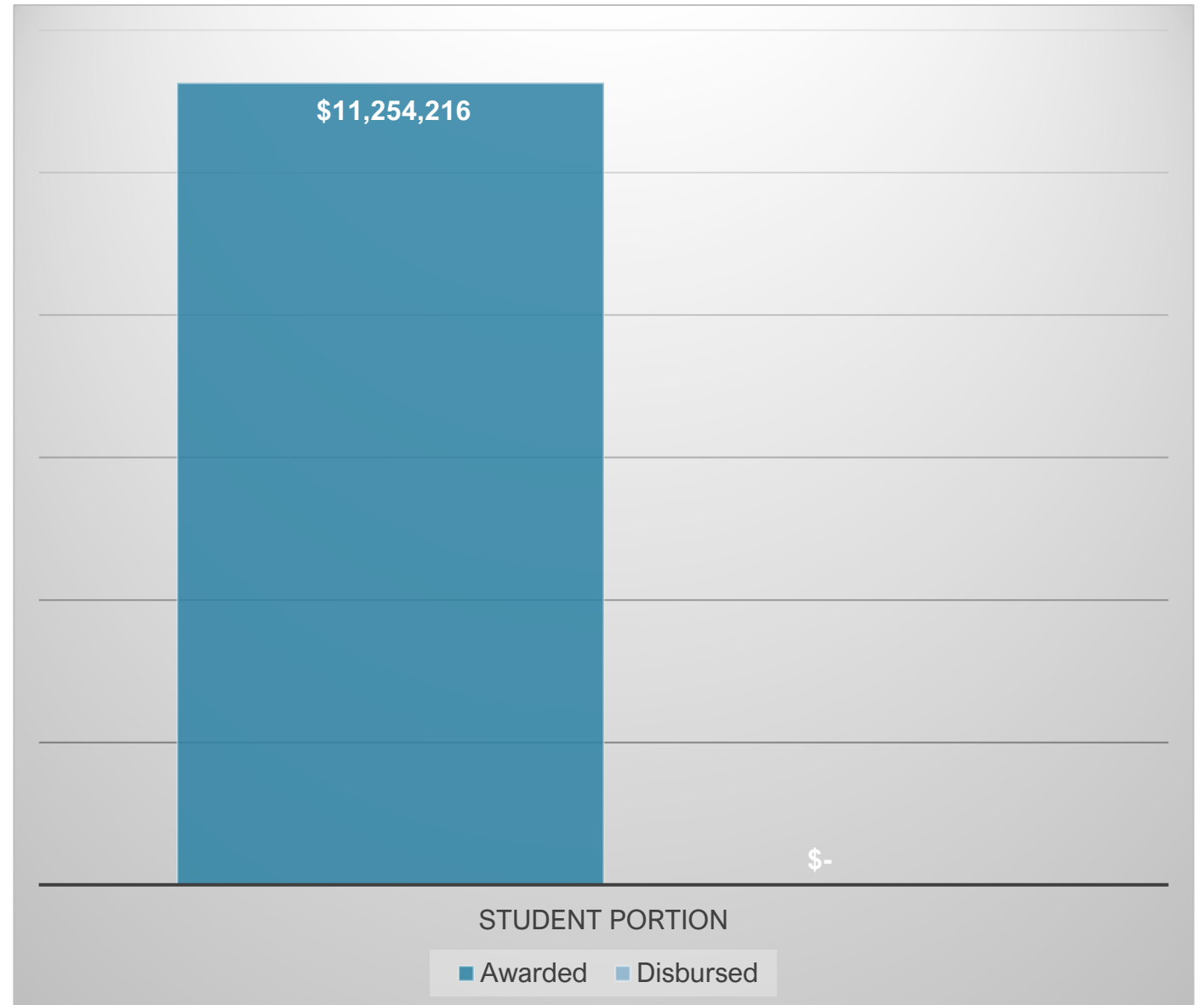
HEERF II – Grant Award and Student Aid Disbursed

 - ◆ Enrolled in Adult Education ICAPS/IET program

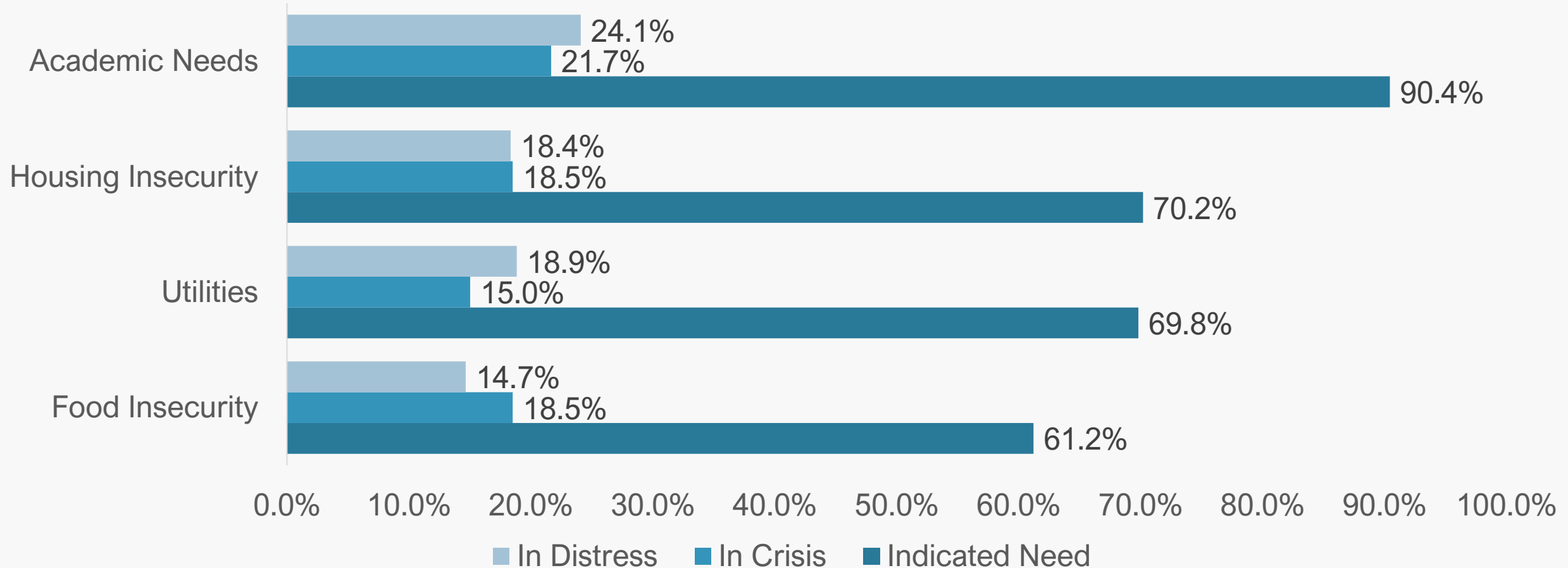
Exceptional Need Disbursements

- ◆ Total of \$3,129,600 disbursed

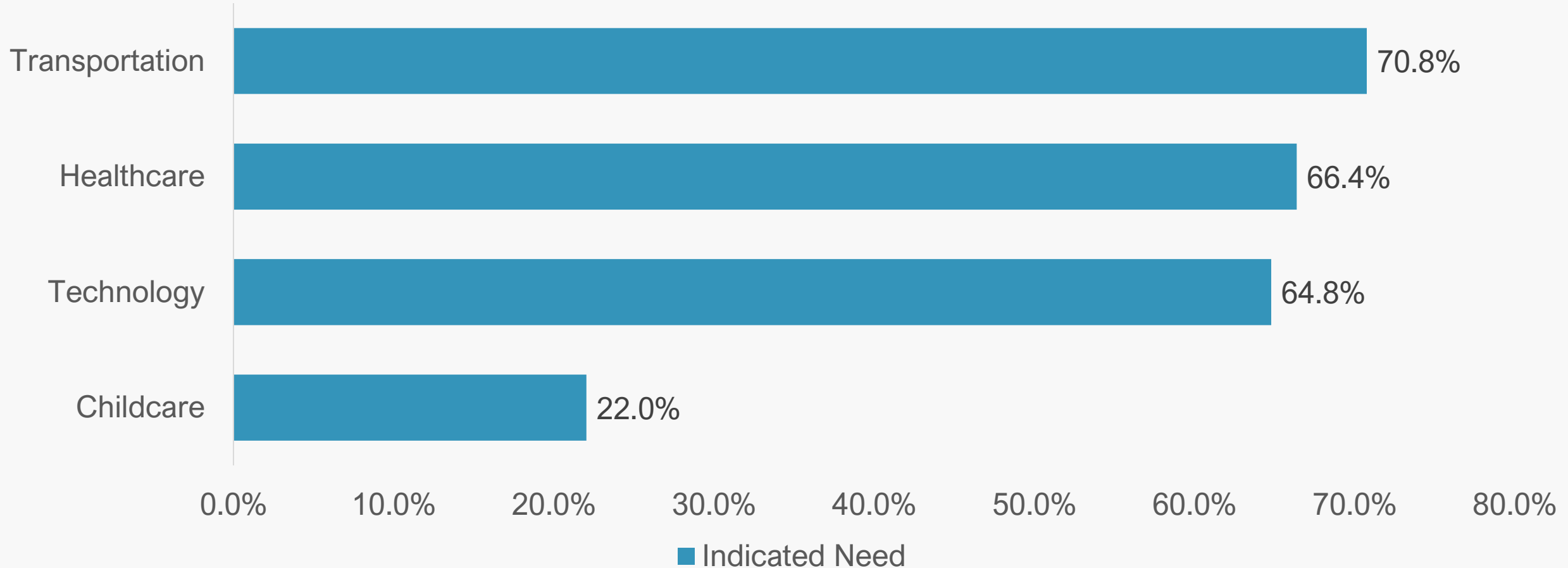

Student Emergency Aid Spring & Summer 2021

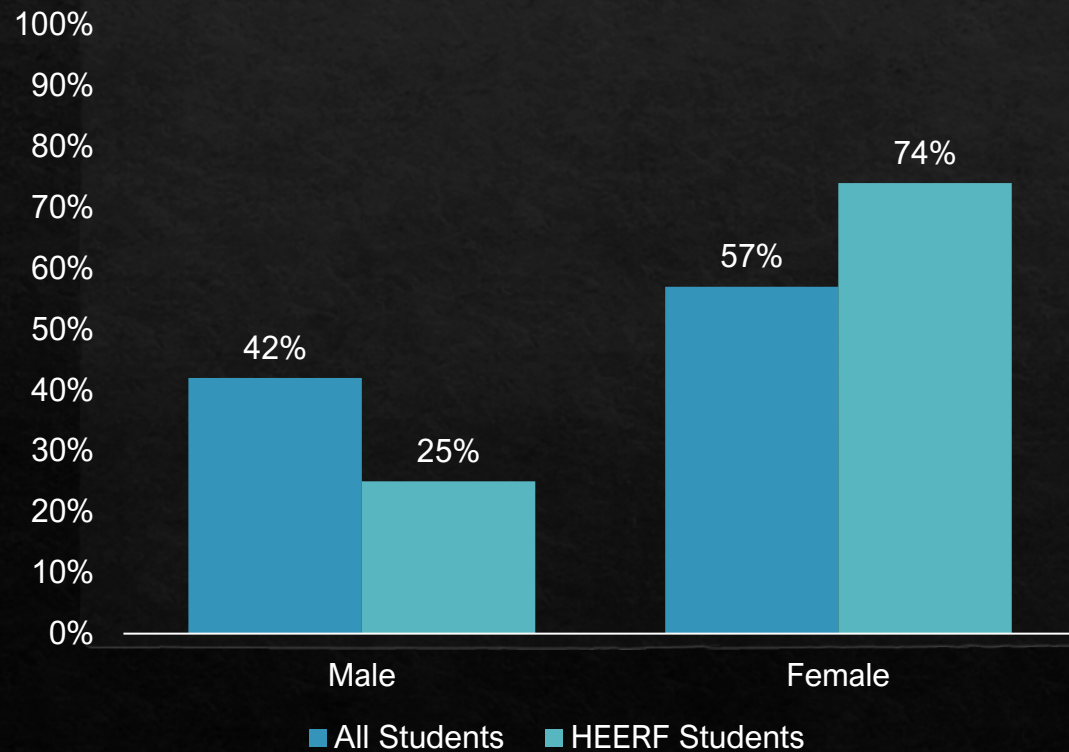
- ◆ Application window was open May 17 - July 22, 2021

Student Emergency Aid Fall 2021

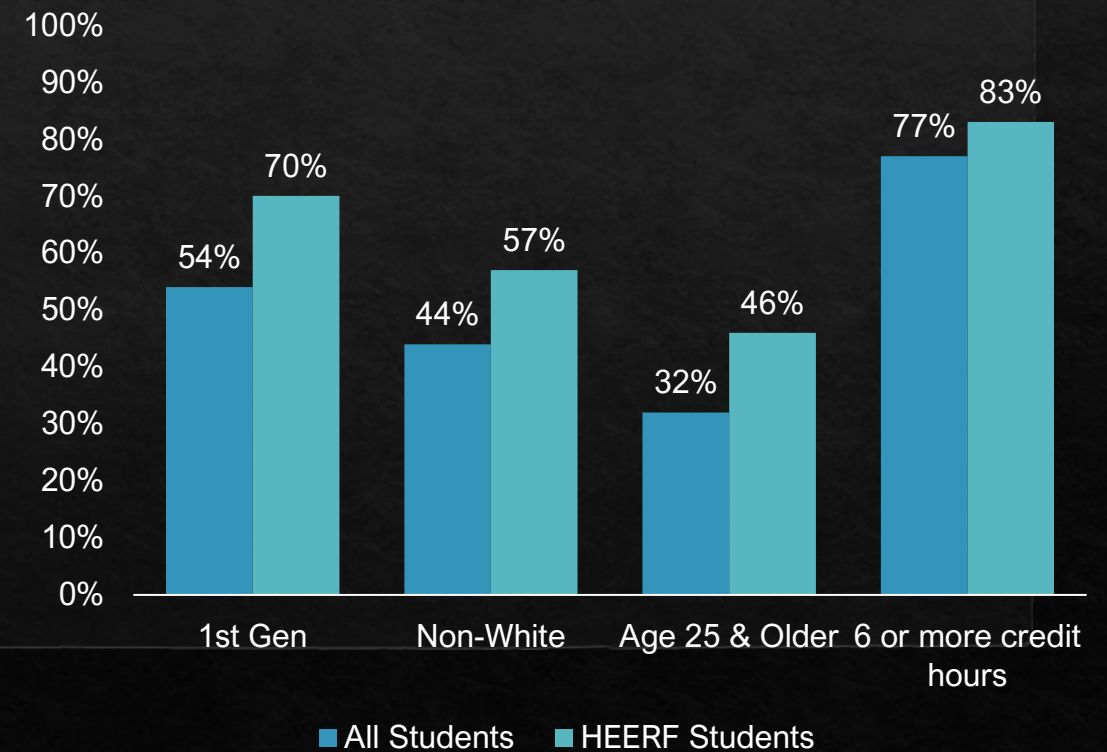
- ◆ Fall 2021 application period opened on July 23 (enrolled or completed orientation)

Students Served - Demographics

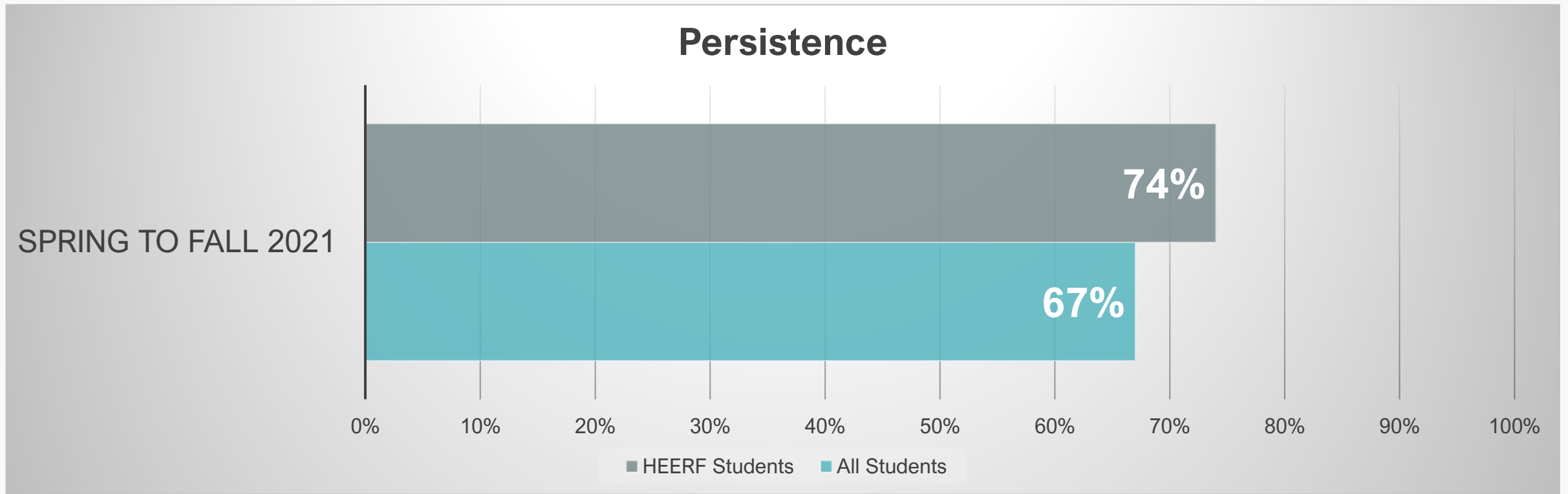
Gender

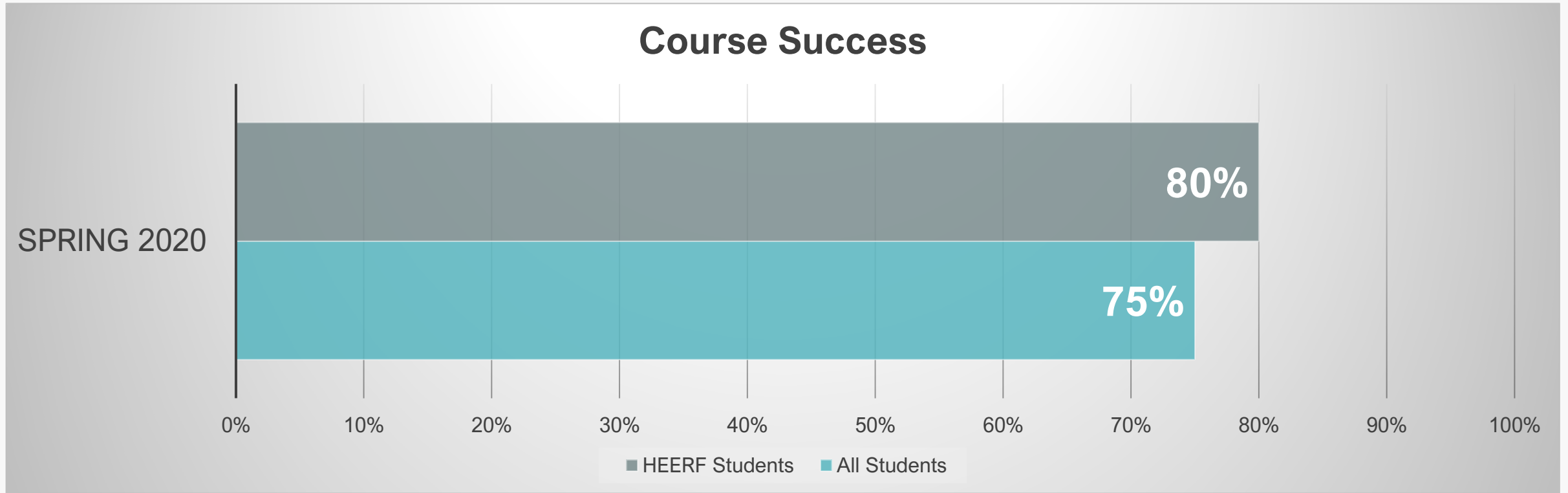


Student Outcomes



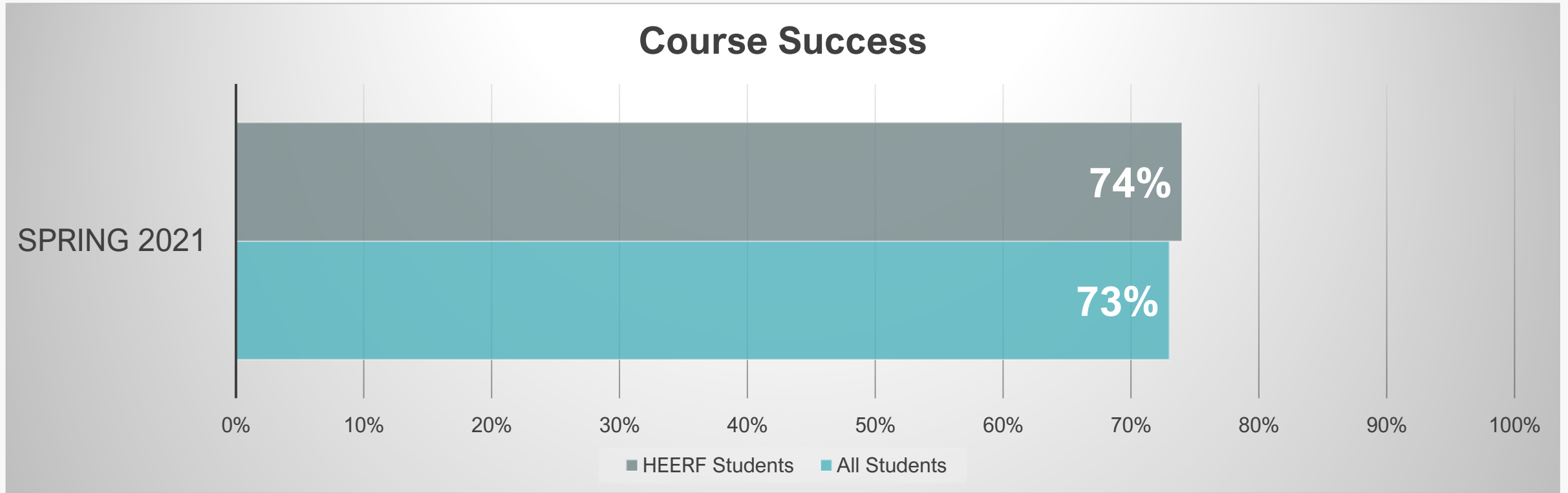
% of students enrolled in Spring 2021 who either are enrolled in Fall 2021 or were awarded a credential in Spring/Summer 2021
