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Harper's Evaluation Results in Maximum Accreditation

After a three-day visit, a six-person evaluation team made the preliminary recommendation for Harper to receive accreditation for the maximum time period of 10 years from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Many months of preparation are involved to produce the required self-study document which was prepared and submitted to the team members before their visit. Vice President of Academic Affairs David Williams and the Steering Committee composed of John Muchmore, Roger Mussell and Joann Powell, under the advisement of the Campus Response Committee, representing most campus committees and groups, have been working on this project for more than two years.

In addition to satisfying accreditation requirements, the self study gives the College community an opportunity for an honest and critical self-evaluation. The self study focused on the College and its mission, the organization and resources of the College, the impact of the programs and services and the future of Harper College. The 143-page report will be thoroughly reviewed by the evaluation team prior to their submission of a final report.

The team met with the Board of Trustees, the Faculty Senate, Classified Staff officers, student representatives, the Campus Response Committee and with individual faculty and staff members. The evaluation team chair, Dr. Christine Gram, commented on the spirit of collegiality and caring which she and team members observed in every area of Harper College.

Members of the North Central Association Visiting Team represent various educational disciplines and geographical areas of the country.

In addition to Dr. Gram, President of Oakland Community College in Michigan, the team includes Dr. Ralph Duncan, Dean of Science, Health and Business at Front Range Community College in Colorado; Dr. William Guither, professor of chemistry at

the University of Wisconsin Center-Fox Valley, Wisconsin; Donald Halog, associate professor of English at Delta College, Michigan; Dr. James Lahr, Dean at St. Louis Community College, Missouri; and Mrs. Arnette Ward, provost from Chandler/Gilbert Community College, Arizona.

The official letter of accreditation status will arrive following final action by the North Central Association in the spring of 1988.

From the Chair

Institutional Planning Committee

The North Central Evaluation team that recently visited the campus described Harper's planning process as *dynamic*. The Institutional Planning Committee is an integral part of that process. Chaired by Pat Mulcrone, the committee of 18 meets twice a month with more frequent meetings of subcommittees.

During 1984-85 the Long Range Planning Committee was reorganized to become the Institutional Planning Committee. The primary goal of the planning process and one of the most difficult to achieve is to involve all members of the institution.

The committee's most recent task was to place into categories and priority order 83 different goals proposed by departments, divisions and individuals. Before recommendations are made, all faculty and staff members are invited to attend a series of four open hearings scheduled for the specific purpose of eliciting a response to the goals submitted through comments or questions.

In addition to IPC, the Board of Trustees is involved in strategic planning every other year and there is continuous planning

within divisions and departments.

Chairperson Pat Mulcrone comments that the process is necessarily an ongoing activity; if planning stands still, stagnation results. Although the workload is heavy, Mulcrone enjoys her involvement in the planning process and feels that it is a natural evolution from her association with adult education, which in itself is a commitment to lifelong learning.

Admissions Committee

A recommendation to require ACT test scores for incoming students is currently on the agenda of the Admissions Commit-

tee. Chairperson Dennis Brokke explains that the test scores are not to be used as a basis for admission but as a tool for retention. ACT measures achievement in math, English, social science and science and also provides a composite overall score. The use of this information as an advising tool will result in proper placement of students and therefore will provide each student the best opportunity for success.

The committee of eight persons meets monthly, or more if necessary, to review and evaluate the admission policies, requirements and procedures and to make necessary

recommendations.

Parks and Grounds/ Horticulture Department

Timing plays a big role in the science of horticulture. The art of growing fruits, vegetables and ornamental plants can be learned but, in the end, mother nature plays a big role.

Timing and destiny also played a role in getting Ed Metcalf and Randy Illg together in Harper's Parks and Grounds/Horticulture Department. Neither Metcalf nor Illg planned to be teachers or planned to spend so much time together in their professional lives. Both men came to Harper from the State University of New York (SUNY) in upstate New York.

When Ed Metcalf graduated from college, he was employed by a research company. Research jobs became scarce in the '60s which changed Metcalf's career direction. After receiving a Ph.D. degree from Ohio State University and doing postdoctoral work at Michigan State, he was offered the opportunity to develop a program in the plant science field at SUNY. Along with someone to develop it, the program required a teacher. So Ed Metcalf met the new challenge and discovered that he enjoyed dealing with the students. One of these students, who liked to engage in spirited discussion in the classroom, was Randy Illg.

After he "barely made it out of high school" and after trying his hand at a variety of jobs, Illg reports that he decided to give the plant science course at SUNY a try. He discovered talents that he never before knew he had and eventually became a technical assistant in the Conservation Department at SUNY.

In 1974, Metcalf heard about a community college in the Chicago area that was interested in starting a horticulture program. The challenge to develop an entire program from the

ground up was very appealing. Metcalf accepted the challenge with enthusiasm and came to Harper College. When he discovered the scope of the Harper program, he knew he needed an associate to share the duties. The Metcalf/Illg partnership was born simultaneously with Harper's Parks and Grounds/Horticulture program.

Both ventures have succeeded well. The Harper program is one of the most comprehensive in the area, offering hands-on experience to the students through instruction and demonstration by their actively involved instructors. Both Metcalf and Illg are enthusiastic about the progress that occurs in many of the students in the program. They also have high praise for the Harper administration which has supported the program monetarily and philosophically.

There have been many success stories from the program. Area employers and park district coordinators are often in touch with Metcalf and Illg for their expertise as well as for employee recommendations. The cooperation between the former teacher and student has grown into a successful professional working relationship which benefits the Parks and Grounds/Horticulture department and the students enrolled in the program.

As a result of a recent Illinois Supreme Court ruling, any individual who was a participant in SURS prior to 9/1/74 and who did not file a letter of intent to preserve his/her right to purchase SURS credit for time in military service may now do so. All you need is to send SURS a letter stating that you want to purchase your military service along with a copy of your military separation papers (DD-214) or some other document showing your active duty dates.
